Yisca Harani



Yisca Harani was born in Jerusalem (1961), to a traditionally observant Jewish family. She pursued higher education at the Society for Protection of Nature in Israel (SPNI), the Israeli government-certified Tour Guide course, the Seminar Ha-

Kibbutzim Teachers College and in the History of Religions Department at Tel Aviv University, where she specialized in Christianity in the Holy Land with a particular interest in the eastern churches.

Ms. Harani is an educator and consultant on Christian affairs in both the private and public sectors, including the Ministry of Public Security, the Ministry of Religions and the Ministry of Tourism. She began her interreligious activities in 1989, with the goal of educating religious ac-

tivists and Israelis unconnected with academic circles.

Ms. Harani has since taught thousands of Israelis: her listeners have experienced an intensive study of Christianity and encounter with the Christian "other."

Among her various initiatives aimed at bringing together Moslems, Christians and Jews, she introduced (1999) a project involving communication and correspondence between Jewish and Arab school children from Tel Aviv and the Old City of Jerusalem. Hesitation and other obstacles were overcome by concerted efforts and exceptional collaboration with the school principal in the Old City, Sister Frida Nasser. The project was replicated with another group. Ms. Harani seeks every opportunity to further interreligious contact based on learning, understanding, and acceptance of what people hold in common as well as what makes them different.

Margaret Karram



Margaret Karram was born (1962) into a catholic family in Haifa, to parents of Palestinian background. During her childhood she became increasingly aware of the common humanity linking her and her Jewish friends, as children of

the one Creator. Her deep conviction that the future lay in understanding, respect, and mutual appreciation of each other's gifts and talents, led her to take a Bachelor's Degree in Jewish Studies in the United States, (University of Judaism, Lee College, Los Angeles).

She has worked with the Focolare Movement for more than 30 years. In 2001 she was appointed delegate of the Movement – Work of Mary – in Israel and the Palestinian Territories. She is a member of the Episcopal Commission for Interreligious Dialogue, (Assembly of the Catholic Ordinaries of the Holy Land), and she also serves on the board of the Interreligious Coordinating Council in Israel (ICCI). She was one of the main organizers of an international Jewish-Christian symposium held in Jerusalem in 2009 as well as other significant conventions to which she invited Jews, Arab Christians and Muslims, with whom she has long maintained enduring friendships. In recent years Margaret has been invited to speak at many events both in Israel and abroad and to testify to her experience of interreligious dialogue.

Mount Zion Foundation / Mount Zion Award

The Mount Zion Award for reconciliation was founded in 1986 by Wilhelm Salberg, a Catholic Priest from Essen (Germany), who died in 1996. The Award has been presented biannually since 1987 to individuals and institutions that made an outstanding contribution to the enhancement of dialogue between the different religions and cultures in the Holy Land and of mutual understanding between Jews, Christians and Muslims.

The presentation always takes place at the end of October, because on October 28, 1965, the 2nd Vatican Council published the text "Nostra Aetate" which attracted much attention. With this "Declaration concerning the relationship of the church towards the non-Christian religions", the Latin Church adopted a new attitude towards Judaism, Islam and other religions, which is characterized by respect.
